Location and time

The Conference will be held from 9 – 13 September 2002 at Grado Congress Hall and at Portorož Auditorium (Cultural & Conference Centre Portorož) Portorož, Slovenia.

Official Language The official language is English (no simultaneous translation)

Insurance The organisers accept no liability for personal injuries sustained, or for loss of

Electricity The electric current in Slovenia is 220 volts, 50 Hz.

Climate September at the north Adriatic is usually warm with air temperatures about

23°C. Bathing and other sporting facilities are available.

Geography and History

This year's ICMM event will be held on two shores of the Gulf of Trieste. The most suitable geographical description for this area would be as the northernmost part of the Mediterranean. The Gulf of Trieste belongs to three countries: to Italy in the north, Croatia in the south, and Slovenia in between.

Geology reveals a soft flysch ground underlying the landscape in the surroundings of Trieste Gulf. Over the centuries, the delta-formed mouths of numerous rivers were mostly turned into saltpans and used by the local population.

Cultivated slopes in the hinterland of the Gulf are covered with vineyards (of the local refosco wine) and olive trees. This is the northernmost area for olive trees; for this outstanding geographical feature, the olive oil grown in this region was, for its particular taste, especially appreciated by ancient Romans.

The history of the region on the North Adriatic is so rich that it cannot be limited to a brief account. The settlement can be traced back to the ancient times when the Gulf of Trieste was not a gulf at all: the Adriatic Sea emerged some hundreds kilometres southwards. The only feature that the civilisations shared over the past was a perpetual interchange of cultures and languages. Despite having to cope with incessant changes of state forms, power and political systems, an interesting population and culture mix of Romanic and Slavic origin has remained here since the so-called historical time, and hopefully you will experience the heritage of the past during your stay here.

Registration

The registration fee includes entrance to all sessions, coffee and tee during breaks, a copy of the Final Programme, name badge, all congress documents, a list of participants, lunch, excursion to Aquilea and Pula- Brioni. Transfers from Grado Italy to Piran Slovenia and visit to the City, Maritime Museum and the Salt-pans Museum.

The registration for the accompanying persons includes entrance to the opening ceremony and excursion to Aquilea and Pula- Brioni.


Payment for accommodation and other hotel services should be made directly at the hotels upon checkout.
